Title page

Title of the article,

The author(s) full names,

Qualifications,

Abstract

Begin the paper with an abstract (maximum of 250 words). The abstract should be in both English and Māori regardless if the language used in the texts is English or Māori. The author should nominate up to ten key words.

Introduction and main text

The main text should be in Māori or English. When writing in English use short sentences. When writing in Māori and English conform to the recommendations of 'Te Taura Whiri i te Reo Māori', use macrons to mark the lengthened vowel sounds. Abbreviations should in general be avoided. However, some phrases may be abbreviated if their shortened form is widely known and if they are used repeatedly in an article, e.g. TPK, NZMC. When first used in the text, they should be spelt in full followed by the abbreviation in brackets.

In-text citations

In the main text, footnotes and endnotes should be avoided. References should be identified by a number enclosed in parentheses, e.g:

"This finding was first reported by Smith (1994), although subsequent workers (Brown, 1992; Jones, 1990) have failed to replicate it".

Illustrations

The presentation of data, particularly large amounts using line art or images is encouraged. For accepted articles, illustrations should be presented as high-contrast glossy prints with lettering which is legible after reductions to the width of one of the Journal's columns. Any page incorporating tables should be as a separate file.

Appendices

Because of pressure of space, appendices containing questionnaires or similar material cannot be included.

References

At the end of the paper, list references in alphabetical order. Unpublished data and personal communications may be listed as references and listed in the main text, as for other reference lists with the phrase “(in press)” inserted after the authors, title, and full name of the journal.

Listing References:

All references should be listed alphabetically on a separate page of the manuscript using the conventions of the American Psychological Association (APA).

For journal articles:

For chapters in edited books:

Please note:

All journal titles must be quoted in full (no abbreviations); punctuation of the year, volume number and page numbers must be precisely in accordance with the previous examples; no part of any reference is to be underlined. When referring to books, the city in which book was published must be stated and the publisher's name must be given in full; the words Company, Co., Limited, Pty Ltd, Inc., etc, are, however, not to be included.

Papers with non-conforming reference lists will be returned for revising which will lead to a delay in publishing.
